SWANLEA FILMMAKERS HELP PROMOTE STEWART HEADLAM PRIMARY SCHOOL

The staff at Stewart Headlam Primary School, our nearest neighbouring school, have wanted to make a film to celebrate and promote their school to local parents. With numbers of parents and children falling in the local area for all schools they felt it was important to have something very positive to show to the community.

So, as part of our Community Links with the Business and Enterprise bid we have employed Indymedia to produce a DVD. Six students from Swanlea have worked closely with Kalim from Indymedia learning skills ranging from audience for film; how to use various types of camera from shoulder mount to tripod using microphone for sound (and one strange camera called the Fig Rig

which has more movement and different angles); marketing and fundraising.

The Year 8 Swanlea students have accompanied Kalim to Stewart Headlam primary school working with a group of children from Year 6 who worked on a brainstorm for themselves about what they thought the film should show about their school. They chose the film locations along with Indymedia and the primary pupils will also do voiceover. Swanlea has been there every step of the making the DVD.
